Personal Prophecy – Potential or Certainty?

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Today we will discuss personal prophecy, and what we can & should do towards seeing prophetic words fulfilled in our lives.

1 Timothy 1:18 (NCV) Timothy, my child, I am giving you a command that agrees with the prophecies that were given about you in the past. I tell you this so you can follow them and fight the good fight.

- Timothy had prophetic words spoken over his life at his ordination service before he was sent to Ephesus in Greece
- Apostle Paul writes to Timothy & reminds him about these prophecies, and instructs him to fight the good fight (of faith)

(KJ21) ... the **prophecies which went** <u>before</u> concerning thee (you), that thou (you) by them might(est) wage a good warfare ...

- Prophecies were spoken over Timothy's life <u>before</u> (in the past)
- Prophecies also went before him they pointed to & declared his future
- He was told to use these prophecies & wage a good warfare by them

(GNB) ... Use those words as weapons in order to fight well ...

- We should **know** & **remember** the words of prophecy spoken over us
- It is good practice to transcribe significant personal prophecies, and:
 - o Take the words to God in prayer & remind Him of what He said
 - o Ask God what you must do, so He can do what only He can do
 - o Fight discouragement & despondency with the words of prophecy

Isaiah 43:26 (GW) Remind me of what happened. Let us argue our case together. State your case so that you can prove you are right.

NKJ: ...put Me in remembrance ...

- God is not forgetful but many of us are!
- Personal prophecy is God reaching out to us, to encourage us, & pull us up higher in our commitment to Him

A few important points about personal prophecy:

- Personal prophecies do not automatically come to pass!
- Personal prophecies speak mainly into the potential of a person rather than the certainty of their fulfilment
- For personal prophecies to be fulfilled, two main things must happen:
 - 1. We must prepare ourselves to step into our God-ordained future
 - 2. When we have done our part, God will do His part

Psalm 75:6–7 (NIV) No one from the east or the west or from the desert can exalt themselves. 7 It is God who judges: He brings one down, he exalts another.

KJV. vs. 6 Promotion comes ... from ... God ... He is the Judge ...

- Only God can promote us into our God-ordained destiny
- He knows when we are ready to go to the next level

Pressure & Speed

- New levels, new devils (Quote by Joyce Meyer)
- Our next level will bring increased pressure and higher speeds
- Invisible flaws in our lives don't show up until pressure & speed increases
- Example of unbalanced wheels on cars the higher the speed, the greater the wobbles
- 1 Corinthians 16:8–9 (AMP) I will remain in Ephesus [however] until Pentecost, 9 For <u>a wide door of opportunity for effectual [service] has opened to me</u> [there, a great and promising one], and <u>[there are] many adversaries.</u>
 - Personal Prophecies announce new doors of opportunity God has for us
 - Each new door of opportunity comes with new adversaries
- 2 Corinthians 2:12 (NLT) When I came to the city of Troas to preach the Good News of Christ, the Lord opened a door of opportunity for me.
 - Paul speaks of a door of (ministry) opportunity that God opened for him
 - Evidently, God considered Paul ready for this new ministry opportunity

Why do personal prophecies sometimes not (fully) come to pass?

Provided that a personal prophecy is truly God-inspired, there are some main reasons why they sometimes do not come to pass:

- Inactivity
 - God speaks to us through prophecy to invoke in us a <u>deeper</u> <u>commitment</u> to Him and <u>greater engagement</u> in His Kingdom
- Insufficient spiritual growth & development
 - Certain giftings & functions in us are not unlocked until we reach the required spiritual maturity
- Insufficient character growth & personality development
 - For our own protection, and for the protection of others around us,
 God limits our promotion until we are ready for it

Psalm 78:41 (NKJV) Yes, again and again they tempted God, and limited the Holy One of Israel.

- Ultimately, it isn't God who limits us instead, we limit ourselves
- 1 Timothy 1:18–20 (NCV) Timothy, my child, I am giving you a command that agrees with the prophecies that were given about you in the past. I tell you this so you can follow them and fight the good fight. 19 Continue to have faith and do what you know is right. Some people have rejected this, and their faith has been shipwrecked.
 - Continue to have faith this speaks of spiritual growth & development
 - Do what you know is right this speaks of character growth
- 1 Timothy 4:14–15 (HCSB) Do not neglect the gift that is in you; it was given to you through prophecy, with the laying on of hands by the council of elders. 15 Practice these things; be committed to them, so that your progress may be evident to all.
 - Do not neglect the gift that is in you ...
 Timothy, function at your full capacity & potential
 - Practice these things ... do something!
 - Be committed to them
 - So that your progress may be evident to all Progress in God's purposes comes by being committed to God

Inactivity	stalls progress
Immaturity	hinders progress
Impatience	overshoots progress & causes regress

2 Timothy 1:6 (NKJV) Therefore I remind you to stir up the gift of God which is in you through the laying on of my hands.

(NLT) ... fan into flames the spiritual gift God gave you ...

- Timothy, get on fire for God
- Don't get impatient if doors don't open immediately
- Don't get jealous with others if their doors open before yours

Biblical Examples:

- 1. Moses spent 40 years in the desert to prepare himself for his open door
 - a. He was 40 years old when he tried to help his Jewish brothers
 - b. At 80 years old, he was finally ready to lead them out of Egypt
- 2. David spent approx. 15 years to prepare himself for his open door
 - a. David was anointed by Samuel to be the next king in his teen years (1 Samuel 16:12-13)
 - b. David was crowned the king of Judah at age 30 (2 Sam. 2:4,5:4-5)
 - c. It took a further 7 ½ years before he was finally crowned king of Israel (2 Sam. 5:3)

Four words:

- **Prayer** fight the good fight of faith in prayer
- Preparation preparation time is never wasted time
- Performance serve well where you are now keep a good attitude
- Promotion be available
